PRELIMINARY 2021 BOND REFERENDUM PROJECT DESCRIPTIONS BY DRAFT PROPOSITIONS

STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

Alley Reconstruction

Reconstruction of deteriorated concrete alleys or construction of new alleys in existing residential areas. Funding will be transferred to specific projects as they are identified.

Arterial Concrete Street Reconstruction and Overlay – PW

Concrete pavement repair of streets, bridges, and sidewalks on divided thoroughfares throughout Plano. Ultra-thin asphalt overlay may be included with street repairs. Funding will be transferred to specific projects as they are identified.

Intersection Improvements

Addition of left- and/or right-turn lanes at various intersections throughout the City. Funding will be transferred to specific projects as they are identified.

Residential Street & Alley Repair - PW

Pavement repairs on streets, alleys, bridges and sidewalks within residential neighborhoods. Funding will be transferred to specific projects as they are identified.

Residential and Collector Street Reconstruction

Reconstruction of residential and collector roadways throughout Plano.

Screening Wall Reconstruction

Complete reconstruction of concrete screening walls along major thoroughfares. Funding will be transferred to specific projects as they are identified.

Sidewalks

Installation of new sidewalks as necessary at locations throughout Plano. Funding will be transferred to specific projects as they are identified.

Traffic Improvements

Improvements include construction of new traffic signals, intersection improvements, pedestrian safety and accessibility measures, neighborhood traffic calming improvements, installation of conduit and concrete bases for street lighting along major thoroughfares, and computerized signal system improvements to include installation of video cameras at critical intersections with wireless communication links to the Traffic Management Center.

PARK AND RECREATION FACILITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS PROJECTS

Tom Muehlenbeck Recreation Center Renovation

Additional improvements at the Tom Muehlenbeck Center to update the facility including fire, sound, lighting and irrigation systems, a roof replacement, parking lot light replacements, updated interior paint and flooring, interior pool deck, slide and play

feature replacement, exterior pool equipment and shade structure replacement and some minor building modifications.

Community Park Renovations

Renovations at community parks 20 years and older. May include athletic field renovation, new playground equipment, shade shelter replacement, accessibility improvements, and restroom, lighting, and irrigation replacements. Locations may include Hoblitzelle East, Horseshoe, Windhaven, Arbor Hills Nature Preserve playground, Schell North, and Bob Woodruff North.

Neighborhood Park Renovations

Renovations at neighborhood parks 20 years and older. May include new playground equipment, shade shelter replacement, accessibility improvements, and lighting and irrigation replacements. Locations may include Longhorn, Steeplechase, Tejas, Cottonwood Creek Greenbelt (at Springhurst), and Sunset.

Trail Replacements

Replace trail segments in poor condition. Locations may include Chisholm Trail Underpass at Spring Creek Parkway, Santa Fe Trail, Bob Woodruff North, Bob Woodruff South, and Hoblitzelle East.

Park Improvements

Continued development of parks throughout the city to include sidewalk completions, park walkways, trees, playground expansions, lighting, benches, restrooms, picnic areas and other related park improvements. Includes funding to respond to public requests or to respond to needs that are unforeseen at the time of bond creation. Includes funding to master plan future parks/facilities and to conduct studies/analyses where needed.

Recreational Trails

Continued development of the recreational trail system throughout the City in accordance with the Parks, Recreation, Trails & Open Space Master Plan and the Bicycle Transportation map.

Maintenance Facility

A maintenance facility east of 75 to replace the 40 year old Schell Maintenance Facility.

Park Restroom Replacements

Replace aging and poorly performing restrooms. Locations may include High Point, Enfield north and south.

Irrigation Renovations

Renovate poorly functioning, inefficient park irrigation systems and associated turf areas. Locations may include Shawnee, Timberbrook, Shoshoni, Wagon Wheel, Lonestar, Hackberry, and Eldorado.

Red Tail Pavilion Renovation and Improvements

Additional improvements at the amphitheater including updated facility signage, additional seating, dressing rooms, concession /ticketing area, storage building, a permanent stage structure, additional restrooms, shaded picnic areas, and related improvements.

Athletic Field Improvements

Improvements may include additional fencing, restroom improvements, new irrigation systems, additional spectator fabric shade structures and related improvements at existing athletic sites.

Lighting Replacements

Replacement of aging athletic field lighting. Locations include Enfield and Carpenter 7 & 8.

Jack Carter Park, Phase II

Continued park development in accordance with the site Master Plan developed in cooperation with area residents in 2018. Improvements identified on the site Master Plan may include improved playing fields, pavilion, restroom, pickle ball, volley ball, multi-use court, landscape, and lighting.

Los Rios Park, Phase II

Continued park development in accordance with the site Master Plan developed in cooperation with area residents. Improvements identified on the site Master Plan may include expanded trail connections, playground, pavilion, restroom, trees, and irrigation.

Bruce Glasscock Park

Development of a new park in accordance with the site Master Plan developed in cooperation with area residents in 2019. Improvements identified on the site Master Plan may include sidewalks, walkways, pavilion, landscape, irrigation, seating and lighting.

Street Enhancements

Enhanced median and street landscaping at selected locations throughout the City.

Median Renovations

Renovated median landscaping at selected locations throughout the City.

Oak Point Recreation Center Exterior Lighting

Replace existing High Intensity Discharge parking lot lighting with energy efficient LEDs and new poles at the recreation center located at 6000 Jupiter Road.

Courtyard Theater Roof

Replacement of the roof of the Courtyard Theater facility located at 1509 H Avenue.

Plano Center Roof

Partial replacement of the roof of the Plano Center facility located at 2000 East Spring Creek Parkway.

PUBLIC SAFETY FACILITIES

Fire Station 5 Remodeling

Remodeling and expansion, including ICC 500 storm shelter and new apparatus bay, of the fire station located at 5115 West Park Boulevard.

Fire Station 8 Remodeling

Remodeling and expansion, including ICC 500 storm shelter and new apparatus bay, of the fire station located at 4555 Hedgecoxe Road.

Parking Canopies

Installation of fabric hail canopies at the fleet services facility at 4120 West Plano Parkway and at police substations located at 7501-A Independence Parkway and 4640 McDermott Road.

Police Training Academy Renovation

Renovation of locker rooms at the police training center located at 4912 14th Street.

Fire Station 4 Restroom Remodeling

Remodeling of restrooms at the fire station located at 6000 Roundrock Drive.

Justice Center Elevator Replacement

Replacement of elevators in the Robinson Justice Center located at 900 East 15th Street.

Fire Station 7 Overhead Doors

Replacement of overhead doors for the apparatus bay at the fire station located at 5602 Democracy Drive.

Fire Station 7 Bay Floors

Replace floor coating with non-skid surface in the apparatus bays of the fire station located at 5602 Democracy Drive.

Fire Station 2 Bay Floors

Replace floor coating with non-skid surface in the apparatus bays of the fire station located at 2630 West 15th Street.

Fire Station 4 Roof

Replacement of the roof of the fire station located at 6000 Roundrock Drive.

Fire Station 3 Roof

Replacement of the roof of the fire station located at 3520 Sherrye Drive.

Fire Station 7 Roof

Replacement of the roof of the fire station located at 5602 Democracy Drive.

Fueling Stations

Construction of fueling sites for city vehicles and equipment at three locations to be determined.

MUNICIPAL FACILITIES

City Council Chambers Renovation

It is with great pleasure that the City of Plano Bond Referendum Citizen Advisory Committee (BRCAC) submit to City Council our 2021 Bond Referendum Priority Ranking Matrix for Facilities, Parks and Recreation and Street Projects. The BRCAC began reviewing proposed projects in August and have met on a monthly basis through our final meeting on December 16, 2020 in which the final priority listing was determined and voted on.

In addition, the BRCAC recommends that consideration be given to increasing street intersection improvement projects from 4 locations to 6 locations. For the 2025 Bond Referendum, the BRCAC would also like for consideration be given to include a Senior Center on the west side of town. The overall dollar amount of the proposed \$403 million 2021 Bond Referendum should be determined by City Council based on continuing the City's mission of providing outstanding services and facilities that have made the City of Plano the City of Excellence for future generations to come.
