#### **Background**

The Buffington Community Services Grant is appropriated by City Council at \$2 per capita. BCSG funds provides public service activities directly to Plano residents, with special consideration given to those agencies offering:

- Short-term, urgent economic assistance, or care services; or
- Immediate relief of crisis impacting the physical and/or mental health of Plano residents.

During the months of April and May, the Community Relations Commission held six public meetings including one public hearing to consider agency requests for 2018 BCSG funding. On May 31, 2018, the Commission held a meeting to determine agency funding recommendations. Thirty-six (36) requests, in the amount of \$3,949,167, were considered during the Consolidated Grant process. Nineteen (19) requests were recommended for Buffington Community Service Grant (BCSG) funds; seven (7) requests were recommended by the Commission for CDBG and HOME funds. The Commission approved these recommendations in a vote of 6-0.

#### Next Steps

If the recommendations are accepted, the City Manager will include the recommended agency amounts in the FY 2018-19 Budget.

# **Summary of FY 2018-19 Consolidated Grant Process**

- 36 application requests for funding: \$3,949,167
- Consolidated grant allocation total: \$2,742,435
- Five requests for federal funds for housing and/or site improvements (construction) from four agencies
- 31 requests for public service funding from 26 agencies



# Summary of FY 2018-19 **Consolidated Grant Process**

- Seven applications funded with U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Funds
- Three public service requests funded with Federal funds at \$216,000 (Max. 15% of CDBG funds)
- 19 requests recommended for funding with BCSG at \$562,781 (\$2/Capita)



# History of the Buffington **Community Services Grant**

- Community Services Grants established in 1998 to address community social service needs.
- Renamed to Buffington Community Service Grants (BCSG) in 2006 to honor Robert W. Buffington's 30 years service to Plano, primarily in Community of Development.
- Funded at \$2 per Capita: FY 2018-2019 → \$562,781



# **BCSG** Objective

- City Council amended the objective in January 2015
- "The Buffington Community Services Grant (BCSG) supplies funds for programs that *provide public service* activities directly to Plano residents, with special consideration given to those agencies offering short-term, urgent economic assistance or care services, offering immediate relief of crisis impacting the physical and/or mental health of Plano residents."





# **BCSG Guidelines**

- Award is limited to 50% of any agency's budget;
  - Typically less than 25% of budget
- Available to non-profit agencies who have been in operation for three years
- General categories of assistance include: food, clothing, shelter, transportation, medical or crisis counseling care, or any other social services provided directly to individuals or households.





# **BCSG Requirements**

Funds must go to programs that:

- Provide public service activities directly to Plano residents, with special consideration given to those agencies offering:
  - Short-term, urgent economic assistance or care services, and
  - Offer immediate relief of a crisis impacting the physical and/or mental health of Plano residents.
- Meet a Consolidated Plan Goal

Subject: Cultural Affairs Commission Arts & Events Grants Recommendations 2018-19

Total funding in the amount of \$1,290,186 for arts and events grants in FY 2018-19 is recommended by the Cultural Affairs Commission. Funding is recommended to all fourteen (14) arts applicants in the full capped amount of \$1,000,000 under the Major Arts Grant, an 11.1% or \$100,000 increase over FY 2017-18; and to four (4) of five (5) applicants in the amount of \$290,186 under the Special Events/Urban Town Center Events Grant, a 5% or \$15,990 decrease from the FY 2017-18. The Commission did not receive applications to the Small Arts Grant for funding under \$1,000.

Grant Application, Funding and Scoring

### **Grant Application**

A complete application includes the following:

- Organization details Administrator, Finance Officer, and volunteer hours
- 12 narrative questions artistic merit, funds usage, and administrative and financial responsibility
- 3-year budget comparison
- Funding Details Income/revenue and itemized expenses
- Board of Directors and leadership diversity
- Supporting documents including Articles of Incorporation and IRS Form 990

## **Grant Eligibility**

All applicant organizations must meet all eligibility criteria:

- Possess 501(c)3 nonprofit status
- Produce events and/or programming within the City of Plano
- Have programming, administrative practices, and board membership which do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex or disability
- Have fulfilled all prior contract obligations to grantors successfully if previously funded
- Be based in Plano

### **Grant Restrictions**

Current grant application restrictions include:

- Grant request will not exceed 25% of the organization's most recently completed fiscal year's expenditures, excluding fundraising activities
- Organizations applying for City of Plano Major Arts Grants are not eligible for Small Arts Grants in the same grant cycle
- All in-kind goods/services must be recognized in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP)

### **Grant Limitations**

Items which the City of Plano will not fund include:

- Grants to individuals
- Reduction of deficits from or expenditures related to activities of previous fiscal years
- Mortgage interest and depreciation on real property or capital improvements
- Activities in which academic credit is given
- Fines, penalties or costs of litigation
- Underwriting or subscriptions, investments, stocks, bonds or any financial obligation




### **The North Texas Nonprofit Arts Economy**



Subject:	Summary of 2018-2019 Heritage Preservation Grant Program Recommendations

The Heritage Commission would like to thank the City Council for the opportunity to provide input and make recommendations for the Heritage Preservation Grants Program. For Fiscal Year 2018-2019, the total amount of funding available is estimated at \$800,000. Four applications were received, which included:

The total amount requested for the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 exceeds the estimated available funds for the Heritage Preservation Grants Program by \$38,463.13.

There were three returning applicants from previous grant years and one new applicant. Heritage Farmstead Museum (HFM) and The Plano Conservancy for Historic Preservation, Inc. (PCHP) are both returning applicants that received heritage grant funds for Fiscal Year 2017-2018. North Texas Masonic Historical Museum and Library (NTMHML) last received heritage grant funds for Fiscal Year 2015-2016. The Texas Pool Foundation (TPF) is a new applicant.

HFM and PCHP have both asked for funds to be used for operation and maintenance costs. This portion of the agencies' proposed budgets typically accounts for the majority of the grant requests. HFM and PCHP are small non-profit agencies that rely on the grant funds for their operation and have only minor financial support from other resources that could be used towards operations and maintenance expenses. In Fiscal Year 2009-2010, a cap was set on the amount each agency may receive for operations and maintenance consistent with the amount each agency was awarded for their 2009-2010 heritage grants. NTMHML and TPF did not request any funds for operation and maintenance costs.

#### **Heritage Commission Recommendations**

As the total amount requested for the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 exceeds the estimated available funds, the Heritage Commission's strategy in developing its recommendation was to first remove any projects which lacked application or eligibility requirements. After determining the remaining projects met the program goals, applicants were asked to prioritize their projects by the greatest need for funding. Funding for projects of lowest priority were eliminated or reduced until the total recommended amount equaled the estimated available funds. The list below summarizes the recommended funding for each applicant.

<u>Heritage Farmstead Museum</u>: HFM has requested funding for four heritage projects, as well as operations and maintenance costs. The Heritage Commission is recommending complete funding of Collections & Supplies and the Outbuilding Restoration projects and partial funding of the Special Events and Marketing projects, totaling \$140,964. A total of \$330,000 is requested for operations and maintenance, which is the eligible threshold for this organization. Therefore, the total amount of funds the Commission recommends to be awarded to HFM is \$470,964.

<u>The Plano Conservancy for Historic Preservation</u>: PCHP has requested funding for three heritage projects, as well as operations and maintenance costs. The Heritage Commission is recommending complete funding of the Museum Update II and Historic Cemeteries projects and partial funding of the Outreach Education project, totaling \$104,439. A total of \$145,000 is requested for operations and maintenance, which is the eligible threshold for this organization. Therefore, the total amount of funds the Commission recommends to be awarded to PCHP is \$249,329.

<u>North Texas Masonic Historical Museum and Library</u>: NTMHML has requested funding for five heritage projects. The Heritage Commission is recommending complete funding of the projects for Flooring, Book Cases, and Security System & Doors/Locks related to the Grand Master's Room and partial funding of the Plano Mutual Cemetery Marker Restoration project, totaling \$17,457. The Heritage Commission is recommending no funds be awarded for the Display Cases & Workstations project as the required number of bids for this project were not submitted with the application. Therefore, the total amount of funds the Commission recommends to be awarded to NTMHML is \$17,457.

<u>Texas Pool Foundation</u>: TPF has requested funding for three heritage projects. The Heritage Commission is recommending complete funding for the Marketing project and partial funding of the Swimming Pool Restoration, totaling \$62,250. The Heritage Commission is recommending no funds be awarded for the 2019 Historical Reunion Event as it was questionable whether the project was restricted under the program limitations and restrictions. Therefore, the total amount of funds the Commission recommends to be awarded to TPF is \$62,250.

The Commission appreciates the opportunity to be a part of this evaluation process. A complete summary of the Heritage Commission recommendations for the Fiscal Year 2018-19 Heritage Preservation grants is included as an attachment to this memorandum.




