Background

The Plano City Council established a Community Services Grant in 1998 to address the community's social service needs. The grant utilized general funds to fund programs that provide short-term, urgent economic assistance or care services, as well as offer immediate relief of a crisis impacting the physical and/or mental health of Plano residents. In 2006, the Community Service Grant was renamed to the Buffington Community Services Grant (BCSG) in honor of the former Community Services Manager, Robert W. Buffington's, 30 years of service to Plano, primarily in the field of Community Development.

The City of Plano uses a consolidated grant process to allocate Buffington Community Service Grant (BCSG) funds. As mentioned previously, HUD funds come from the federal government. BCSG funds are appropriated by City Council at \$2 per capita. BCSG funds provides public service activities directly to Plano residents, with special consideration given to those agencies offering:

- Short-term, urgent economic assistance, or care services; or
- Immediate relief of crisis impacting the physical and/or mental health of Plano residents.

During June 2020, the CRC held six (6) public meetings, including one (1) public hearing, to consider agency requests for 2020 CDBG and HOME funding provided to the City of Plano by HUD. On June 18, 2020, the Commission held a meeting to determine agency funding recommendations. Twenty-seven (27) requests, in the amount of \$1,508,983, were considered during the Consolidated Grant process. Four (4) requests were recommended by the Commission for CDBG and HOME funds, and fifteen (15) requests were recommended for Buffington Community Service Grant (BCSG) funds. The Commission approved these recommendations in a vote of 8-0-0.

Next Steps

If the recommendations are accepted, the City Manager will include the recommended agency amounts in the FY 2020-21 Budget.

2020 Buffington Community Services Grant Recommendations

2020 – 2021 Commission Accomplishments

- Welcomed three new Commissioners
- Successfully held grant application hearings and one public hearing via Zoom.
- Improved the quality of grant applications by requiring limiting each agency application submittal to two applications total; one program support application and one site improvement/housing application.
- Administered five, twice a week, agency grant application hearings



Summary of the FY 2020 - 21 Consolidated Grant Process

- 27 application requests for funding: \$1,508,983
- Consolidated grant agency allocation total: \$974,241
- Four requests for federal funds for housing and/or site improvements (construction) from four agencies
- 25 requests for public service funding



Summary of the FY 2020 -21 Consolidated Grant Process

- Four applications funded with U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Funds
- Two public service requests funded with Federal funds at \$102,780 (Max. 15% of CDBG funds)
- 15 requests recommended for funding with BCSG at \$570,538 (\$2/Capita)



History of the Buffington Community Services Grant

- Community Services Grants established in 1998 to address community social service needs.
- Renamed to Buffington Community Service Grants (BCSG) in 2006 to honor Robert W. Buffington's 30 years of service to Plano, primarily in Community Development.
- Funded at \$2 per Capita: FY 2020-2021 →\$570,380



Buffington Community Services Grant (BCSG)

 "The Buffington Community Services Grant (BCSG) supplies funds for programs that provide public service activities directly to Plano residents, with special consideration given to those agencies offering short-term, urgent economic assistance or care services, offering immediate relief of crisis impacting the physical and/or mental health of Plano residents."



BCSG Guidelines

- Award is limited to 50% of any agency's budget
 - Typically less than 25% of budget
- Available to non-profit agencies who have been in operation for three years
- General categories of assistance include: food, clothing, shelter, transportation, medical or crisis counseling care, or any other social services provided directly to individuals or households



BCSG Requirements

Funds must go to programs that:

- Provide public service activities directly to Plano residents, with special consideration given to those agencies offering:
 - Short-term, urgent economic assistance or care services, and
 - Offer immediate relief of a crisis impacting the physical and/or mental health of Plano residents.
- Meet a Consolidated Plan Goal

Subject: Cultural Affairs Commission Arts & Events Grants Recommendations 2020-21

Total funding in the amount of \$1,063,441 for Cultural Arts and Community and Cultural Events grants are recommended by the Cultural Affairs Commission for FY 2020-21 to fifteen (15) arts applicants and to six (5) of the seven (7) events applicants. This includes one (1) new applicant in each category and one (1) applicant that did not meet minimum criteria for recommendation.

Major Arts & Special Events grants are funded through Hotel/Motel Tax Receipts and a funding cap is set by council for Arts Grants on a yearly basis. 2020-21 funding recommendations include funding for Major Arts Grants in the amount of \$800,000, 20% or \$200,000 under the 2019-21 cap and to Special Events in the amount of \$279,441, 20% under 2020-21 scored award amounts.

Although the total percent increase is up 12% from 2019-20, due to a new event applicant, the total combined cost savings from last year will be \$249,137.



Subject: Summary of 2020-2021 Heritage Preservation Grant Program

Recommendations

The Heritage Commission would like to thank the City Council for the opportunity to provide input and make recommendations for the Heritage Preservation Grants Program. For Fiscal Year 2020-2021, the total amount of funding available is estimated at \$640,000. Four applications were received, which included:

The total amount requested for the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 exceeds the estimated available funds for the Heritage Preservation Grants Program by \$149,990.

The Heritage Farmstead Museum (HFM), The Plano Conservancy for Historic Preservation, Inc. (PCHP), North Texas Masonic Historical Museum and Library (NTMHML), and The Texas Pool Foundation (TPF) are all returning applicants that received heritage grant funds for Fiscal Year 2019-2020.

The HFM and PCHP have both requested funds for operation and maintenance costs. This portion of the agencies' proposed budgets typically accounts for the majority of their grant requests. The HFM and PCHP are small, non-profit agencies that rely on the grant funds for their business functions and have limited financial support from other resources that could be used towards operations and maintenance expenses. During the 2009-2010 Heritage Grant Program, a cap was set on the amount each agency received for operations and maintenance expenses. The amount awarded for operation and maintenance that year serves as the maximum request for this budget line item considered for future grant requests. NTMHML and TPF are ineligible for operations and maintenance funds as neither organization received grants for this purpose during the 2009-2010 Heritage Preservation Grant Program.

Heritage Commission Recommendations

The Heritage Commission considered the FY 2020-2021 Heritage Grant Program request at their June 23 regular meeting. As the total amount requested exceeded the estimated available funds, the Heritage Commission's strategy in developing its recommendation was to first remove projects which failed to meet application or eligibility requirements. After scoring the remaining projects for consistency with program goals, each applicant was asked to prioritize their projects by the greatest need for funding. Funding for lower scoring or lower priority projects were eliminated or reduced until the total recommended amount was consistent with the estimated available funds. A summary of the grant funding recommendations for each applicant is provided below.

<u>Heritage Farmstead Museum</u>: The HFM requested funding for three heritage projects, as well as operations and maintenance costs. The Heritage Commission recommended partial funding for all three heritage projects: Special Events, Marketing, and the Ammie Wilson House Structural Improvements, totaling \$50,000. The sum of \$330,000 was requested for operations and maintenance, which is the eligible threshold for this organization. The total amount of funds the Commission recommended for the HFM was \$380,000.

The Plano Conservancy for Historic Preservation: The PCHP requested funding for three heritage projects, as well as operations and maintenance costs. The Heritage Commission recommended complete funding for the Museum Virtual Reality Project and partial funding for the Outreach Education project, totaling \$61,500. The PCHP stated during the grant deliberations the Museum Electrical Room Project was a lower priority and the Commission recommended no funds for that project. A total of \$145,000 was requested for operations and maintenance, which is the eligible threshold for this organization. The total amount of funds the Commission recommended for the PCHP was \$206,500.

North Texas Masonic Historical Museum and Library: The NTMHML requested funding for four heritage projects. The Heritage Commission recommended complete funding for the Marker Repairs at Plano Mutual Cemetery and Advertising projects, and partial funding for the Founding Father's Display project. The Heritage Commission did not recommend funding of the Rear Door Replacement project as it received the lowest score amongst all requested heritage projects. The total amount of funds the Commission recommended for the NTMHML was \$7,830.

<u>Texas Pool Foundation</u>: The TPF requested funding for three heritage projects. The Heritage Commission recommended complete funding of the Marketing Program and Patio Renovation project, and partial funding for the Picnic Tables project. The total amount of funds the Commission recommended for the TPF was \$45,670.

The Commission appreciates the opportunity for involvement with the Heritage Grant Program evaluation process. A detailed summary of the Heritage Commission recommendations for the Fiscal Year 2020-21 Heritage Preservation grants is included as an attachment to this memorandum.

- Increasing communication between local government, property owners, developers, and the public ensures low-impact industry best practices will be used










