The City's current backup solution consumes a significant amount of time and resources to manage and administer. Currently, the legacy solution requires over 40 servers to run the backup solution and utilizes approximately 90 terabytes of disk space. By moving to the Rubrik solution, we will reduce this to two appliances, one for each data center, and allow us to manage the storage platform in one application interface. This purchase will enable us to reduce cost by eliminating virtual servers and reducing our Microsoft server licensing cost.

Currently, the existing backup solution annual maintenance cost is approximately \$190,000 with a yearly increase of five percent on average. The five-year total cost of ownership for the Rubrik solution, including both the initial one-time hardware purchase and software licensing and maintenance to provide higher redundancy and security of backups as well as unlimited cloud management licensing, is \$459,195.25. By purchasing this solution, the City will save approximately \$490,000 in maintenance costs alone over the next five years, not to mention other ancillary cost savings with storage, physical hardware, and labor.

In addition to the benefits already mentioned, Rubrik will provide us with an additional layer of security in our backups by storing the data in a format that is not susceptible to modern day ransomware. Ransomware attacks on government organizations are on the rise, as seen in recent attacks on the City of Atlanta, the Colorado Department of Transportation, and Boston Emergency Services. The City of Plano has invested heavily in security solutions to prevent attacks in multiple ways, and this solution will improve our security posture further by working to help remediate vulnerabilities against the systems that will help us recover from an attack.

Technology Services recommends the purchase of Rubrik backup and recovery solution to Freeit Data Solutions, Inc. for \$459,195.25 from DIR Contract DIR-TSO-3944. Rubrik is an industry-leading backup solution that will allow the City to improve its security posture and speed of recovery in the event of a disaster, while reducing the complexity and administrative overhead of the City's existing backup solution. This will reduce total cost of ownership and improve return on investment by helping to recover valuable storage, compute, and memory capacity.

If we do not move to the new solution, the City will continue to pay a higher cost for storage and administration, and be exposed to a more cumbersome recovery solution, thereby slowing our ability to recover in the event of a disaster and leaving us at a higher risk level due to the increase in ransomware attacks.

The contract fee is \$98,309 which includes project coordination, data acquisition, site investigation, topographic survey, hydraulic analysis, alternative analyses, environmental permitting review and Opinion of Probable Construction Cost (OPCC). The fee is typical for a project of this size and scope.

If this project is not awarded, solutions to resolve the closures and ongoing maintenance problems at the described bridge locations will not be explored and trail closures and excessive maintenance issues will continue.

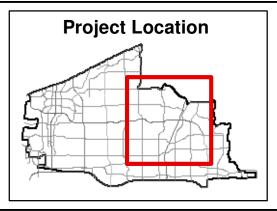

This agenda item is for approval of an expenditure of \$225,000 for a grant of hotel-motel tax revenues to USA Softball DFW, Inc. to host a large national softball tournament.

The Visit Plano and the Plano Parks and Recreation team made a successful bid to host USA Softball's 2018 Girls' 16-Under and 18-Under GOLD National Championships—two of the most prominent tournaments in Junior Olympic (JO) Championship Play. The event is July 15-21, 2018.

This event was awarded to Plano through a bid process we participated in at USA Softball's Annual Convention. If it were not for the foresight of our community leaders and the investment in such facilities as Heritage Yards, High Point Park and Archgate Park we would not be able to host such events.

Our original bid to host this event was for the 2019 tournament but we were offered the 2018 tournament and we did not believe this was something we could pass up. We expected to request funding in our 2018-19 budget if we were awarded the tournament. Funding was not included in our 2017-18 budget and; therefore, we are asking for a supplemental appropriation of \$225,000 from the Convention and Tourism Fund to cover the cost of hosting this tournament in 2018. A separate agenda item is being submitted for the supplemental appropriation.

This event will bring 88-100 teams staying six (6) nights in local hotels generating over 1,200 room stays for each day of the tournament. A conservative estimate, based on information from previous host cities, is that this event will have an economic impact of \$4.1 million dollars on Plano and the surrounding area benefiting hotels, restaurants, retail establishments, gas stations, car rental agencies, caterers, movie theaters and other area attractions.

These 88 teams will bring about 3,546 attendees per day for the 6 days of the tournament broken down as follows.

- 88 teams, 6 teams max from Texas
- 88 teams with 20 members per team (includes 2 coaches) = 1,700
- Plus a fan/family match of 1 per player = 1,584
- Staff of 100 umpires
- USA staff and field staff 50
- Vendors 12
- College coaches/scouts 100

For Plano to host this event, we are asking to provide a grant of \$225,000 from the Convention and Tourism fund (046) to USA Softball DFW, Inc. These funds will be used for the operations and management of this tournament. This event will generate revenues for the City, and no general fund dollars will be used.

With zero impact on the general fund, we believe this will be a win for the City of Plano and the area businesses benefiting from this large event. In particular, it would be a shot in the arm for our hotels because July tends to be one of their slower months. On the other hand, if this grant is not approved, Plano misses the opportunity to host one of the largest sporting events we have ever hosted; and as a destination city, we will miss out on the \$4.1 million dollar economic impact. This event is the type of event Convention and Tourism Fund dollars are intended to support.

Subject: Purchase of Assets from ArtCentre of Plano - Revised

The City of Plano currently owns Saigling House at 902 E 16th St, Plano Texas, 75074, renting to the ArtCentre of Plano. During renovations, ArtCentre of Plano purchased blinds and audiovisual (AV) equipment necessary to complete the city's vision of an arts and events center in Historic Downtown Plano. The installation of these assets preserves the allure and rental appeal of Saigling House.

With approval from the Tax Increment Financing Reinvestment Zone No. 2 Board of Directors, staff recommends the City purchase the blinds and audiovisual equipment initially purchased and installed by the Saigling House tenant, ArtCentre of Plano. Both blinds and AV equipment would then remain with Saigling House as a non-capital City asset. Any repair to and maintenance of blinds and audiovisual equipment would fall within the general lease Agreement Section 13 (Repair and Maintenance), Subsection A (Tenant's Responsibility) executed between the City of Plano and ArtCentre of Plano.

The total amount of purchase is \$126,884 (\$12,102 for blinds and \$114,782 for AV equipment).

Funds to purchase these assets will come from Tax Incremental Financing (TIF). The total of \$126,884 will not, however be paid directly to the ArtCentre of Plano. Instead, it will be considered a good faith payment from the ArtCentre of Plano to the City of Plano on their bridge loan of \$300,000 from the TIF. Taking prior payments totaling \$100,000 into account along with the \$126,884 amount, the balance for repayment to the TIF will then be \$73,116.

Funding for this item is available in the TIF II Fund. This development agreement for a hike and bike trail, in the total amount of \$38,610, will leave an available fund balance of \$9,732,690 available for future expenditures identified in the TIF II Project Plan.

SUMMARY OF ITEM

This item is for approval of a Development Agreement between the City of Plano and BGC SH190TPS LL Plano TX Land Acquisition, LLC, (BGC).

The Towneplace Suites Project is located on K Avenue north of the George Bush Turnpike. BGC is required to construct a 4 foot wide sidewalk along K Avenue as part of their typical development requirements.

This agreement provides for the design and construction of a 10 foot wide, 6 inch thick hike and bike trail in lieu of the required 4 foot wide, 4 inch thick sidewalk along K Avenue. The City will pay BGC \$38,610 which is the difference in cost between the required sidewalk and the 10 foot wide trial. BGC will dedicate the hike and bike trail to the City by plat. Tax Increment Funding will be used for this project. This item was approved by the TIF #2 Board on April 24, 2018.

The K Avenue corridor between Downtown Plano, Richardson's City Line development and the future 12th Street Cotton Belt Station has been identified as a desirable pedestrian connection that will provide both direct and indirect economic and social benefits to the City, residents, and visitors.

If the Agreement is not approved, the construction of the trail at a later date will necessitate the demolition costs of the required sidewalk as well as the disruption of construction activity to hotel guests.

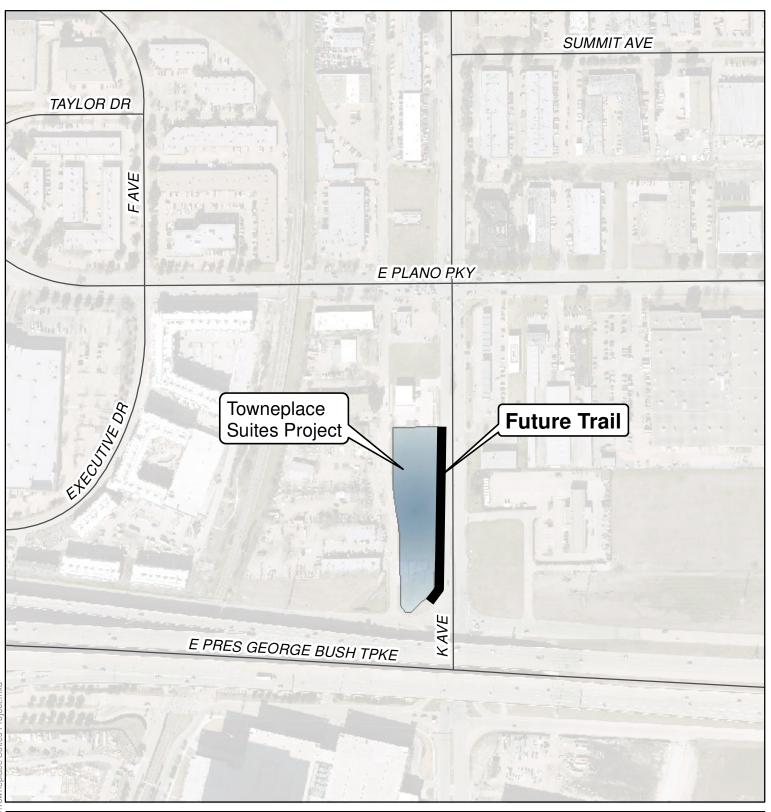

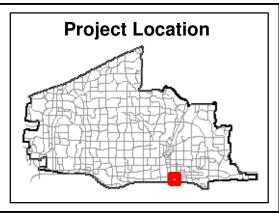




LOCATION MAP

DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF PLANO, TEXAS AND BGC SH190TPS LL PLANO TX LAND ACQUISITION, LLC FOR THE TOWNPLACE SUITES PROJECT

This Development Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the City of Plano, a Texas municipal corporation (the "City"), acting by and through its duly authorized officers, and BGC SH190TPS LL Plano TX Land Acquisition, LLC, a Texas limited liability company ("BGC"):

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City is authorized pursuant to the laws of Texas and its Home Rule Charter to enter into agreements with persons or entities intending to undertake any development on real property for the purposes of providing supporting public facilities and services; and

WHEREAS, BGC desires to develop approximately 2 acres located north of George Bush Turnpike and between K Avenue and J Place (the "Property") and as shown in Exhibit "A" attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, BGC has proposed the development of a hotel on the Property in substantial compliance with a Preliminary Site Plan prepared by BGC attached hereto as Exhibit "B" (the "Plan" or the "Development"); and

WHEREAS, BGC's proposed development is located in Tax Increment Financing District No. 2 ("TIF 2") and is in keeping with the intent of that reinvestment zone to promote sound growth; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the proposed public improvements, the hike and bike trail (the "Hike and Bike Trail") shown in the Plan are to be funded through the revenue derived by TIF 2 in accordance with the Tax Increment Financing Act, Texas Tax Code, Chapter 311, as amended, to promote development and redevelopment in the area through the use of tax increment financing; and

WHEREAS, the Hike and Bike Trail project is consistent with improvements that may be constructed under the TIF2 budget for streetscapes, for which Thirty Eight Thousand Six Hundred Ten Dollars (\$38,610) may be expended; and

WHEREAS, the termination date for TIF 2 is December 31, 2029; and

WHEREAS, BGC's proposed development is consistent with the goals and objectives as set forth in the Downtown Plano Vision and Strategy Update, adopted by the City Council by Resolution No. 2013-2-20(R), dated February 25, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the development of the Property in accordance with the Plan by BGC will contribute important direct and indirect economic and social benefits to the City, including, but not limited to the creation of a hotel development in close proximity to downtown Plano and the DART rail station; and

WHEREAS, the Hike and Bike Trail will contribute important direct and indirect economic and social benefits to the City, including but not limited to improving connectivity between downtown Plano, Haggard Park, City Line, Downtown DART Rail Station, and the future 12th Street Cotton Belt Station; and

WHEREAS, the construction of the Hike and Bike Trail and the Development improves the City's public health, safety and general welfare.

NOW THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS AND OBLIGATIONS HEREIN, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. BGC'S OBLIGATIONS

- A. Prior to receiving the first half of the funding from the City as authorized by this Agreement, BGC shall:
 - 1. Obtain approval of appropriate zoning, a preliminary site plan, preliminary plat and release of engineering plans for construction of public improvements as required to develop a hotel on the Property (the "Development");
 - 2. Obtain all necessary City permits to begin construction of the Development;
 - 3. Request payment from the City in writing.
- B. Prior to receiving the second half of the funding from the City as authorized by this Agreement, BGC shall:
 - 1. Provide design and construction plans for the Hike and Bike Trail to the City for review and approval before construction.
 - 2. Complete the construction and installation of all public improvements described in Exhibit "C" attached hereto. The public improvements, including but not limited to the Hike and Bike Trail, shall be constructed and installed in a good and workmanlike manner in accordance with all applicable laws, statutes and ordinances, rules and regulations of the City and any other governmental authority having jurisdiction, including, without limitation, the City Right-of-Way Management Ordinance, the City Standard Park and Trail Construction Details, the City Code of Ordinances, and the City Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances. The Hike and Bike Trail shall be substantially completed on or before March 30, 2019;
 - 3. Dedicate by plat the public improvements, including but not limited to the Hike and Bike Trail to the City, assign all contractors' warranties and maintenance bonds, and providing any other instrument that the City may reasonably request.
 - 4. Request payment from the City in writing.

SECTION 2. CITY'S OBLIGATIONS

- A. The City shall perform the following obligations:
 - 1. Pay Nineteen Thousand Three Hundred and Five dollars (\$19,305) upon BGC's completion of the requirements in Section 1(A) above and after receipt of BCG's written request for payment. Reimburse BGC for eligible expenses for "Project Costs" (as defined hereinafter) for the Hike and Bike Trail in an amount not to exceed the remaining Nineteen Thousand Three Hundred and Five dollars (\$19,305), after final inspection and acceptance of the public improvements, including but not limited to the Hike and Bike Trail, by the City in accordance with Section 1(B)(2) above and after receipt of BGC's written request for payment. However, such reimbursement shall exclude "Overhead Costs" (as defined hereinafter).
 - 2. "Project Costs" means actual construction and/or installation costs for the Hike and Bike Trail, including but not limited to:
 - Construction of the Hike and Bike Trail required by the City, that is described or specified on the Plans and in the City's Standard Park and Trail Construction Details; and
 - 3. "Overhead Costs" means:
 - i. overhead and management fees of BGC;
 - ii. financing charges;
 - iii. marketing costs;
 - iv. legal fees; and
 - v. payments made to entities affiliated with or related to BGC to the extent such payments made to entities affiliated with or related to BGC do not exceed what is reasonable and customary for such services.
- B. All payments for Hike and Bike Trail reimbursement to BGC under this subsection shall be payable solely from TIF 2 funds as provided by law and shall not be obligated for payment from the City's general fund or any other City fund unrelated to TIF 2 funds;

SECTION 3. DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION

A. Construction inspection will be provided by the City through its Park Compliance Coordinator who will inspect forms and reinforcing steel, and review laboratory verification of concrete strength and perform other inspections as appropriate to determine conformance with the City's Standard Park and Trail Construction Details for the Hike and Bike Trail.

- B. BGC shall obtain any and all required local, state and federal governmental approvals and permits required for construction of the public improvements, including but not limited to the Hike and Bike Trail.
- C. BGC shall require its general contractor to procure and maintain insurance coverage as set forth in Exhibit "D" for the duration of the construction of the Hike and Bike Trail at the Property. BGC shall provide their general contractor's signed insurance certificate to the City verifying that they have obtained the required insurance coverage and naming the City of Plano as additional insured prior to the commencement of construction of the Hike and Bike Trail.
- D. BGC shall procure and maintain insurance coverage as set forth in Exhibit "D" for the duration of this Agreement. BGC shall provide their signed insurance certificate to the City verifying that they have obtained the required insurance coverage and naming the City of Plano as additional insured prior to the commencement of construction of the Hike and Bike Trail.
- E. Except as provided herein, all project designs, drawings, site plans and other documents produced by BGC in connection with the Development, including those attached to this Agreement, shall remain the property of BGC. In exchange for BGC's acceptance of the above-described payment from the City, a PDF of the plans created for the Hike and Bike Trail shall become the property of the City upon dedication as required by Section 1(B)(2) of this Agreement.

SECTION 4. DAMAGE, DESTRUCTION, OR FAILURE OF PERFORMANCE

Should BGC fail to complete installation of the Hike and Bike Trail by the date specified in Section 1(B)(1) of this Agreement, the City shall have no obligation to expend monies to complete the Public Improvements or to pay to BGC the remaining amount under Section 1(B) unless delay of performance is excused under Section 5 below.

SECTION 5. FORCE MAJEURE

It is expressly understood and agreed by the parties to this Agreement that if the commencement, progress and/or completion of the construction of the Hike and Bike Trail contemplated hereunder is delayed by reason by war; civil commotion; acts of God; inclement weather; governmental restrictions, regulations, or interferences; delays caused by the franchise utilities; fire or other casualty; court injunction; necessary condemnation proceedings; or acts of the other party, its affiliates/related entities and/or their contractors, the party so obligated or permitted shall be excused from doing or performing the same during such period of delay, so that the time period applicable to such design or construction requirement shall be extended for a period of time equal to the period such party was delayed.

SECTION 6. TERM

The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date of execution and end upon the complete performance of all obligations and conditions precedent by parties to this Agreement but in no event later than December 31, 2019 (the "Initial Termination Date"), unless extended as provided herein. BGC may request an extension of the Initial Termination Date by providing a written request to the City Manager, which request may be approved by the City Manager or his designee without further City Council approval (the "Extended Termination Date"; the Initial Termination Date together with the Extended Termination Date being herein collectively referred to as the "Termination Date"). Upon the Termination Date this

agreement will automatically terminate and upon request from BGC the City will execute a release in a recordable form acknowledging the termination of this agreement.

SECTION 7. AUTHORITY OF BGC

BGC represents and warrants to the City that BGC is duly formed, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the State of Texas. BGC will provide a certificate of status from the Texas Secretary of State's office evidencing BGC's current legal status and authority to conduct business in Texas. BGC represents that it has full power, authority and legal right to execute and deliver this Agreement. This Agreement constitutes a legal, valid, and binding obligation of BGC and the City, enforceable in accordance with its terms.

SECTION 8. EVENTS OF DEFAULT

A default shall exist if any of the following occurs:

- 1. Either party fails to perform or observe any material covenant contained in this Agreement.
- 2. BGC becomes delinquent on ad valorem taxes owed to the City, or any other Collin County taxing unit, provided that BGC retains the right to timely and properly protest and/or contest any such taxes and during the pendency of such proceedings such taxes shall not be deemed delinquent.

A party shall immediately notify the defaulting party in writing upon becoming aware of any change in the existence of any condition or event which would constitute a default by the defaulting party under this Agreement. Such notice shall specify the nature and the period of existence thereof and what action, if any, the notifying party requires or proposes to require with respect to curing the default.

SECTION 9. REMEDIES

The defaulting party shall have thirty (30) days to cure after receiving written notice of default from a party. If a default shall continue after the thirty (30) days' notice to cure the default, the non-defaulting party may, at its option, terminate the Agreement and/or pursue any and all remedies it may be entitled to, at law or in equity, in accordance with Texas law without the necessity of further notice to or demand upon the defaulting party. However, the non-defaulting party may, at its option, provide written extension for additional time to cure if the defaulting party proceeds in good faith and with due diligence to remedy and correct the default, provided that the defaulting party has commenced to cure such default within 30 days following the original notice.

SECTION 10. BANKRUPTCY

In the event BGC files for bankruptcy, whether involuntarily or voluntary, BGC shall provide written notice to the City within three (3) business days of such event. Bankruptcy shall place BGC in immediate default with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

SECTION 11. INDEMNIFICATION

BGC AGREES TO DEFEND, INDEMNIFY AND HOLD THE CITY AND ITS RESPECTIVE OFFICERS, AGENTS AND EMPLOYEES, HARMLESS AGAINST ANY AND ALL CLAIMS, LAWSUITS, JUDGMENTS, FINES, PENALTIES, COSTS AND EXPENSES FOR PERSONAL INJURY (INCLUDING DEATH), PROPERTY DAMAGE OR OTHER

HARM OR VIOLATIONS FOR WHICH RECOVERY OF DAMAGES, FINES, OR PENALTIES IS SOUGHT, SUFFERED BY ANY PERSON OR PERSONS, THAT MAY ARISE OUT OF OR BE OCCASIONED BY BGC'S BREACH OF ANY OF THE TERMS OR PROVISIONS OF THIS AGREEMENT, VIOLATIONS OF LAW, OR BY ANY NEGLIGENT, GROSSLY NEGLIGENT, INTENTIONAL, OR STRICTLY LIABLE ACT OR OMISSION OF BGC, ITS OFFICERS, AGENTS, EMPLOYEES, INVITEES, SUBCONTRACTORS, OR SUB-SUBCONTRACTORS AND THEIR RESPECTIVE OFFICERS, AGENTS, OR REPRESENTATIVES, OR ANY OTHER PERSONS OR ENTITIES FOR WHICH BGC IS LEGALLY RESPONSIBLE IN THE PERFORMANCE OF THIS CONTRACT. THE INDEMNITY PROVIDED FOR IN THIS PARAGRAPH SHALL NOT APPLY TO ANY LIABILITY RESULTING FROM THE SOLE NEGLIGENCE OF THE CITY, AND ITS OFFICERS, AGENTS, EMPLOYEES OR SEPARATE CONTRACTORS. THE CITY DOES NOT WAIVE ANY GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY OR OTHER DEFENSES AVAILABLE TO IT UNDER TEXAS OR FEDERAL LAW. THE PROVISIONS OF THIS PARAGRAPH ARE SOLELY FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PARTIES HERETO AND ARE NOT INTENDED TO CREATE OR GRANT ANY RIGHTS, CONTRACTUAL OR OTHERWISE, TO ANY OTHER PERSON OR ENTITY. BGC AT ITS OWN EXPENSE IS EXPRESSLY REQUIRED TO DEFEND CITY AGAINST ALL SUCH CLAIMS. CITY RESERVES THE RIGHT TO PROVIDE A PORTION OR ITS OWN ENTIRE DEFENSE; HOWEVER, CITY IS UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO DO SO. ANY SUCH ACTION BY CITY IS NOT TO BE CONSTRUED AS A WAIVER OF BGC'S OBLIGATION TO DEFEND CITY OR AS A WAIVER OF BGC'S OBLIGATION TO INDEMNIFY CITY PURSUANT TO THIS AGREEMENT. BGC SHALL RETAIN DEFENSE COUNSEL WITHIN SEVEN (7) BUSINESS DAYS OF CITY'S WRITTEN NOTICE THAT CITY IS INVOKING ITS RIGHT TO INDEMNIFICATION UNDER THIS AGREEMENT. IF BGC FAILS TO RETAIN COUNSEL WITHIN THE REQUIRED TIME PERIOD, CITY SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT TO RETAIN DEFENSE COUNSEL ON ITS OWN BEHALF AND BGC SHALL BE LIABLE FOR ALL COSTS INCURRED BY THE CITY.

SECTION 12. AFFIDAVIT OF NO PROHIBITED INTEREST

BGC acknowledges and represents it is aware of all applicable laws, City Charter, and City Code of Conduct regarding prohibited interests and that the existence of a prohibited interest at any time will render the Agreement voidable. BGC has executed the Affidavit of No Prohibited Interest, attached and incorporated herein as Exhibit "E".

SECTION 13. NOTICES

Any notice required by this Agreement shall be deemed to be properly served if deposited in the U.S. mail by certified letter, return receipt requested, addressed to the recipient at the recipient's address shown below, subject to the right of either party to designate a different address by notice given in the manner just described.

SECTION 14. WRITTEN NOTICES AND APPROVALS REQUIRED

Whenever under the provisions of this Agreement and other related documents and instruments or any supplemental agreements, any request, demand, approval, notice or consent of the City or BGC is required, or whenever the City or BGC is required to agree or to take some action at the request of the other, such request, demand, approval, notice or consent, or agreement shall be in writing. Approval by

City, unless otherwise provided herein, shall be by the City Manager or his designated representative and approval by BGC shall be by the CEO, CFO or Vice President or any officer of BGC so authorized (and, in any event, the officers executing this Agreement are so authorized); and either party hereto shall be authorized to act in reliance upon any such request, demand, approval, notice or consent, or agreement.

SECTION 15. GIFT TO PUBLIC SERVANT

- A. City may terminate this Agreement immediately if BGC has knowingly offered, conferred, or agreed to confer any benefit upon a City employee or official that the City employee or official is prohibited by law from accepting.
- B. For purposes of this section, "benefit" means anything reasonably regarded as economic advantage, including benefit to any other person in whose welfare the beneficiary is interested, but does not include a contribution or expenditure made and reported in accordance with law.
- C. Notwithstanding any other legal remedies, City may require BGC to remove any employee of BGC from the development of the Public Improvements who has violated the restrictions of this section or any similar state or federal law, and City may obtain reimbursement for any expenditures made to BGC as a result of the improper offer, agreement to confer, or conferring of a benefit to a City employee or official.

SECTION 16. COMPLIANCE WITH EQUAL RIGHTS ORDINANCE

Owner agrees to comply with Section 2-11(F) of the City Code of Ordinances, which reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for an employer to discriminate against any person on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, age, national origin, genetic information, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability status or United States military/veteran status by the following actions or inactions:

- (a) for an employer to fail or refuse to hire, or to discharge, any person;
- (b) for an employer to discriminate against any person with respect to compensation, terms, conditions or privileges, of employment;
- (c) for an employer to limit, segregate or classify employees or applicants for employment in any way that would deprive or tend to deprive a person of employment or employment opportunities, or that would otherwise adversely affect a person's status as an employee;
- (d) for an employment agency to fail or refuse to refer for employment, or to otherwise discriminate against, any person because of a protected employment characteristic;
- (e) for an employment agency to classify or refer for employment any person, on the basis of a protected employment characteristic;
- (f) for a labor organization to exclude or expel from its membership, or to otherwise discriminate against, any person because of a protected employment characteristic;

- (g) for a labor organization to fail or refuse to refer for employment any person because of a protected employment characteristic;
- (h) for a labor organization to limit, segregate or classify its members or applicants for membership, in any way that would deprive or tend to deprive a person of employment or employment opportunities, or that would otherwise adversely affect a person's status as an employee or as an applicant for employment; or
- (i) for a labor organization to cause or attempt to cause an employer to discriminate against a person in violation of this subsection;
- (j) for an employer, a labor organization or a joint labor-management committee, to discriminate against any person because of a protected employment characteristic in the admission to, or employment in, any program established to provide apprenticeship or other training;
- (k) for an employer to print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, any notice or advertisement relating to employment by the employer that indicates any preference, limitation, specification or discrimination, based on a protected employment characteristic;
- (I) for an employment agency to print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, any notice or advertisement relating to membership in or any classification or referral for employment by the employment agency that indicates any preference, limitation, specification or discrimination, based on a protected employment characteristic; or
- (m) for a joint labor-management committee to print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, any notice or advertisement relating to admission to, or employment in, any program established to provide apprenticeship or other training by the joint labor-management committee that indicates any preference, limitation, specification or discrimination, based on a protected employment characteristic."

Owner also understands that it is entitled to apply to the City Manager for a waiver from the Equal Rights Ordinance's application to its business if applying it would conflict with state or federal law. During the review of the waiver request, the Agreement will be placed on hold.

SECTION 17. CERTIFICATION

Contractor certifies that it does not and will not boycott Israel during the term of this Contract. Contractor has executed the Certification, attached and incorporated herein as Exhibit "F".

SECTION 18. APPLICABLE LAWS

This Agreement is made subject to the provisions of the Charter and ordinances of City, as amended, and all applicable laws of the State of Texas and federal laws.

SECTION 19. VENUE AND GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement is performable in Collin County, Texas and venue of any action arising out of this Agreement shall be exclusively in Collin County, Texas. This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas.

SECTION 20. LEGAL CONSTRUCTION

In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision thereof and this Agreement shall be considered as if such invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained in this Agreement.

SECTION 21. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and constitute one and the same instrument.

SECTION 22. CAPTIONS

The captions to the various clauses of this Agreement are for informational purposes only and shall not alter the substance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

SECTION 23. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

- A. The terms and conditions of this Agreement are binding upon the successors and assigns of all parties hereto. Provided, however, this Agreement shall not be assigned without the prior consent of BGC and the City of Plano City Council, which approvals shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- B. An assignment or delegation of this Agreement to an Affiliate of BGC shall not require City Council approval and shall not result in a breach of the Agreement if the Affiliate of BGC expressly assumes all of the obligations of BGC under this Agreement for the balance of the term of this Agreement and provides evidence establishing the relationship between BGC and an Affiliate. BGC shall notify the City in writing, however, within 30 days of such assignment. "Affiliate", as used herein, includes any parent, sister, partner, joint venturer, equity investor or subsidiary entity of BGC; any entity in which BGC is a major shareholder, owns an equity interest or is a joint venturer or partner (whether general or limited). Upon such assignment, BGC shall be released from all liability hereunder. Additionally, collateral assignment of this Agreement by BGC in connection with its financing of the Development shall not require City Council approval and shall not result in a breach of this Agreement so long as all obligations of BGC herein are included in such assignment.

SECTION 24. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement embodies the complete agreement of the parties hereto with respect to the Property, superseding all oral or written previous and contemporary agreements between the parties and relating to matters in this Agreement. This Agreement is the complete and final understanding and agreement between BGC and the City with respect to the Property. Except as otherwise provided herein the agreement cannot be modified without written agreement of the parties to be attached to and made a part of this Agreement.

SECTION 25. INCORPORATION OF RECITALS

PRELIMINARY SITE PLAN

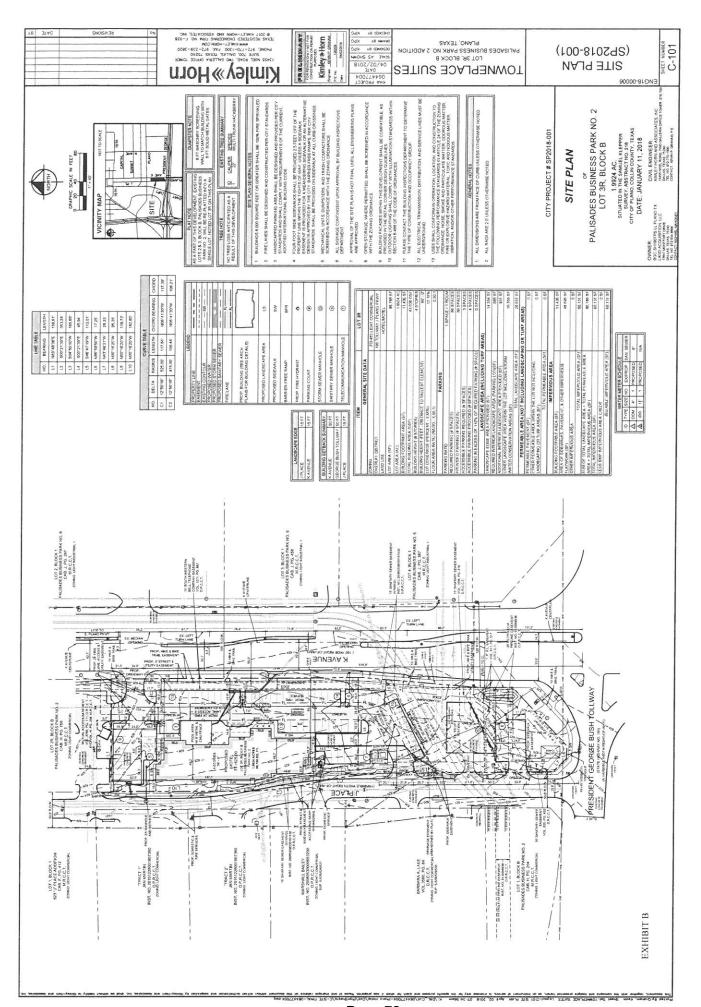

Contractor's and BGC's Insurance Requirements

CITY OF PLANO GENERAL CONTRACTUAL INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

Vendors/Contractors performing work on City property for the City of Plano shall provide the City a certificate of insurance evidencing the coverage's and coverage provisions identified herein. Vendors/Contractors shall provide the City evidence that all subcontractors performing work on the project have the same types and amounts of insurance as required herein or that the subcontractors are included under the vendors/contractor's policy. The City, at its discretion, may require a certified copy of the policies, including all relevant endorsements.

All insurance companies must be authorized by the Texas Department of Insurance to transact business in the State of Texas, must be acceptable to the City of Plano and be placed with an insurer possessing an A-VII A. M. Best rating or better.

<u>Listed below are the types and amounts of insurance required.</u> The City reserves the right to amend or require additional types and higher limits of coverage or provisions depending on the nature of the work.

- The following insurance requirements, coverage's and limits apply to most minor construction (Non-CIP), renovation, service provider, installation and maintenance services, work on City property and professional service contracts.
- 2. Purchases of non-hazardous commodities, equipment, materials and products from distributors and retailers do not require any specific insurance.
- Purchases or contracts involving any hazardous activity or equipment, tenant, concessionaire and lease agreements, alcohol sales, cyber-liability risks, environmental risks, special motorized equipment or property may require customized insurance requirements in addition to the general requirements listed.

Commercial General Liability Insurance—(Required for all minor construction, renovation, service provider contracts involving installation, maintenance or work on City property)

Commercial general liability insurance shall be written on an ISO occurrence form (or a substitute form providing equivalent coverage) and shall cover liability arising from premises, operations, independent contractors, products-complete operations, personal and advertising injury and liability assumed under an insured contract (including the tort liability of another assumed in a business contract).

The City, the City Council and its members, the City's agents, officers, directors and employees shall be included as an additional insured under the commercial general liability policy, including coverage for City with respect to liability arising out of the completed operations.

\$1,000,000 Limit per Occurrence/Aggregate

\$1,000,000 Limit for Personal/Advertising Injury and Products/Completed Operations

Commercial Automobile Liability—(Required for all contracts involving the use of vendor/contractor owned, non-owned or hired automobiles)

Vendor/contractor shall maintain business automobile liability insurance with a limit of not less than \$500,000 each accident or Combined Single Limit.

Such automobile liability insurance shall cover liability arising out of any auto (including owned, hired, and non-owned automobiles). Vendor/contractor waives all rights against City and its agents, officers, directors and employees for recovery by the commercial automobile liability obtained by vendor/contractor pursuant to this section or under any applicable automobile physical damage coverage.

Workers' Compensation & Employer Liability—(Required for all vendors/contractors with employees who perform work or contract services on City property)

Vendor/contractor shall maintain workers' compensation insurance in the amounts required by appropriate state workers compensation statutes. The employer's liability limit shall not be less than \$500,000.

Vendor/contractor waives all rights against City, the City Council and its members, the City's agents, officers, directors and employees for recovery of damages under vendors/contractor's workers' compensation and employer's liability. Vendor/contractor must cause a waiver of subrogation to be effected under its workers' compensation coverage.

Sole Proprietors and companies with no employees may be exempt from this requirement.

Professional Liability (E&O) Insurance—(Required for all Professional Service contracts including but not limited to: architects, engineers, consultants, counselors, medical professionals, attorneys, accountants, etc.)

Professional Liability Coverage (E&O) may be written on a claims made basis but must include an extended reporting period of at least three years after contract completion.

City, the City Council and its members, the City's agents, officers, directors and employees shall be included as an additional insured under the E&O policy, including coverage for City with respect to liability arising out of all errors and omissions of vendor/contractor.

An Ordinance of the City of Plano, Texas, transferring the sum of \$225,000 from the Convention & Tourism Fund Unappropriated fund balance to the Convention & Tourism Operating Appropriation for fiscal year 2017-18 for the purpose of providing funding for the USA Softball 18U and 16U Gold National Tournament, amending the Budget of the City adopted by Ordinance No. 2017-9-6, specifically Section 1, Item "H", to reflect the actions taken herein; declaring this action to be a case of public necessity; and providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Plano approved and adopted the budget for the City for fiscal year 2017-18 setting the appropriations for the Convention & Tourism Fund at \$10,170,971; and

WHEREAS, the City of Plano Parks & Recreation Department is requesting an additional appropriation in the total amount of \$225,000 to provide funding for the USA Softball 18U and 16U Gold National Tournament; and

WHEREAS, such costs cannot be fully met through appropriations in the existing budget; and

WHEREAS, the City Council now finds that additional appropriations to the Convention & Tourism Fund to provide funding for the USA Softball 18U and 16U Gold National Tournament allows for the best utilization of the highest operating efficiency of the Parks & Recreation Department, and that such action is a public necessity.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLANO, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION I. The estimated sum of TWO HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$225,000) is hereby transferred from the Convention & Tourism Unappropriated fund balance to the Convention & Tourism Operating Appropriation, as reflected in Section 1, Item "H" of the ordinance.

SECTION II. The budget of the City of Plano for fiscal year 2017-18 as adopted by Ordinance No. 2017-9-6 is amended to reflect the action taken herein.

SECTION III. The actions taken herein are found and declared to be a case of public necessity.

SECTION IV. This Supplemental Appropriation No. 2 shall become effective immediately from and after the date of its passage.

COMMENTS: Funding for this item is available in the Signals and Sign Shop cost centers within the General Fund budget. Producing special signage and scheduling school zone flashers for summer school, in the estimated amount of \$17,125, will leave a balance of \$171,957 available for future expenditures to address traffic signal maintenance and traffic sign replacement throughout Plano.

SUMMARY OF ITEM

The Plano Independent School District (PISD) has requested the implementation of school speed zones adjacent to 18 school campuses selected to remain open for the June, 2018 summer school session. Because summer school sessions operate during different calendars and operating times than the regular

school year, the City Council adopted Section 12-73.1 Same – Specific Zones – Summer School on April 27, 2009. This section of city ordinances is school and zone specific, and requires annual updates as the PISD selects schools and dates for the summer school session. The Transportation Engineering Division supports the adoption of this ordinance amending Section 12-73.1(d) for the 2018 summer school session. By City Council approval of this ordinance the school zone signs for each affected school will be modified. The estimated cost to install the signs is \$17,125.

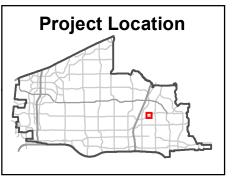
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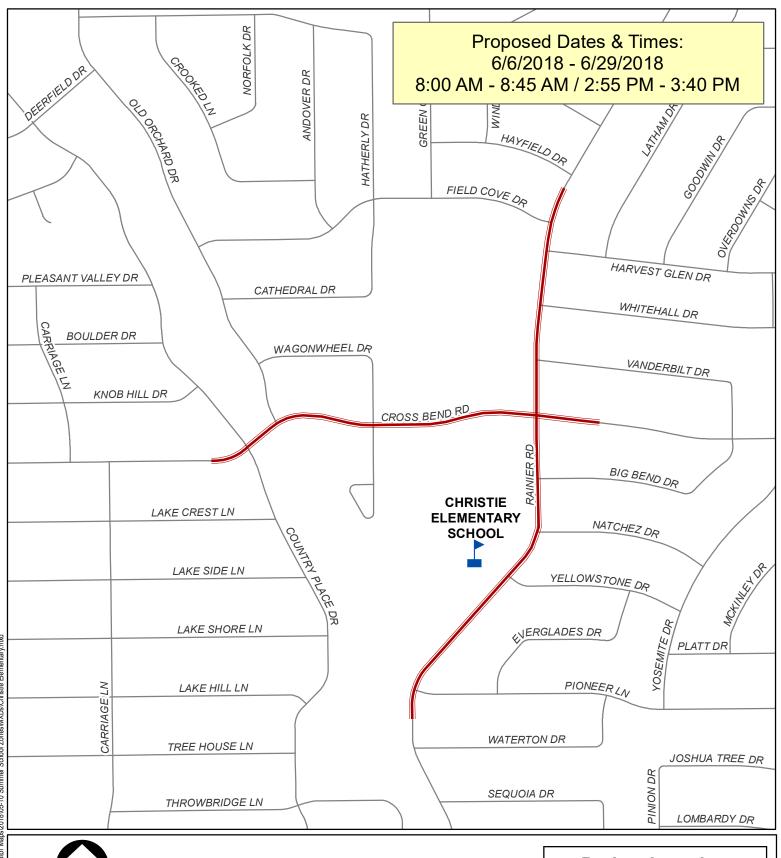
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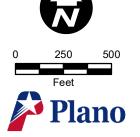




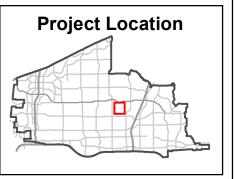
Barron Elementary School Summer School Zone Map



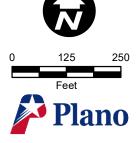




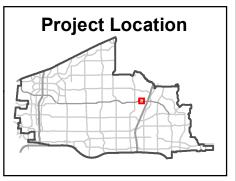
Christie Elementary School Summer School Zone Map







Clark High School Summer School Zone Map

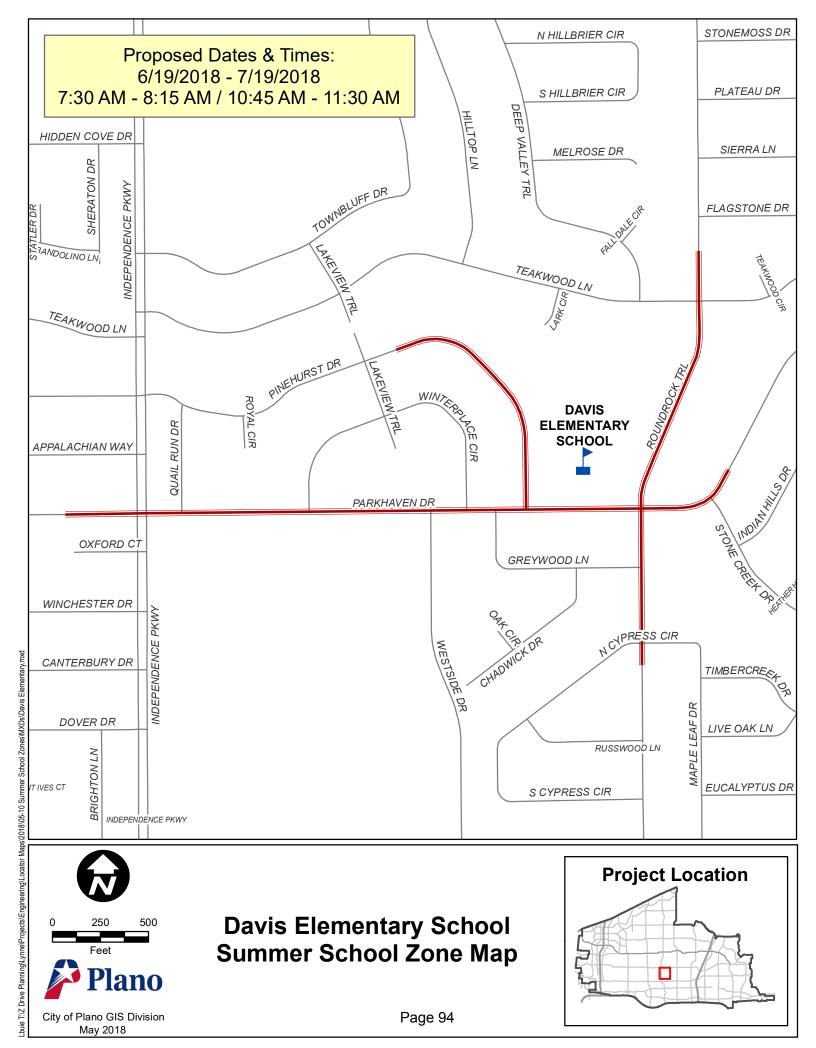


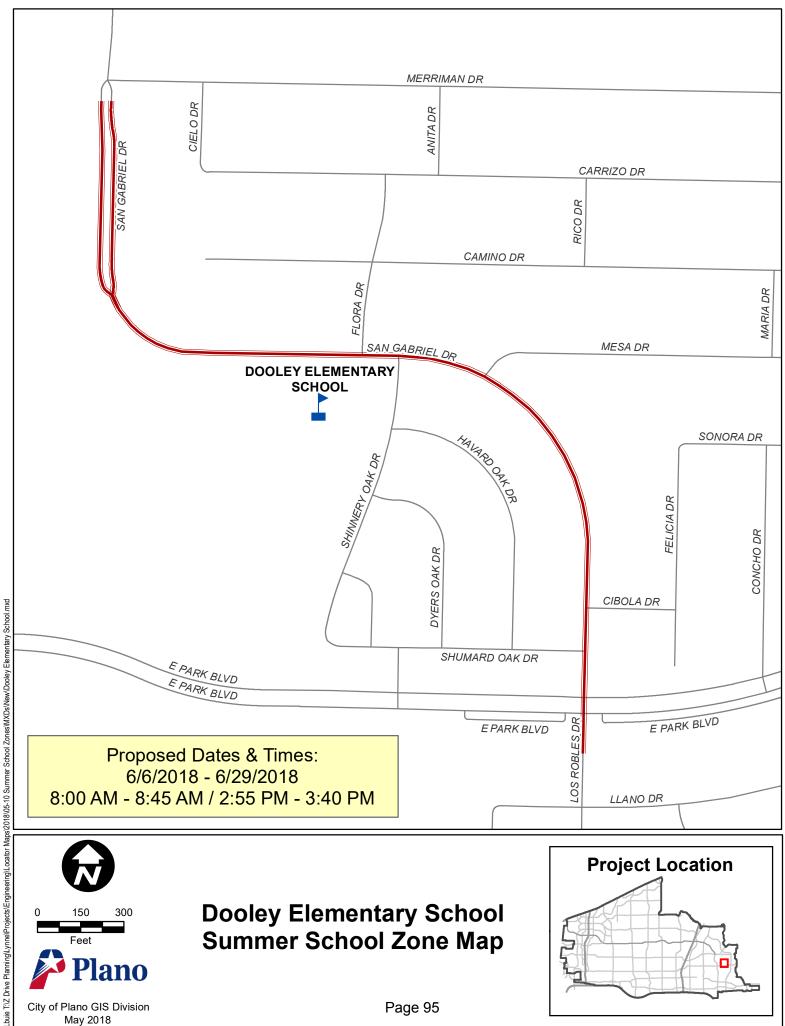


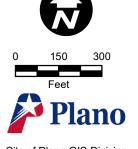
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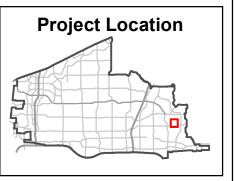

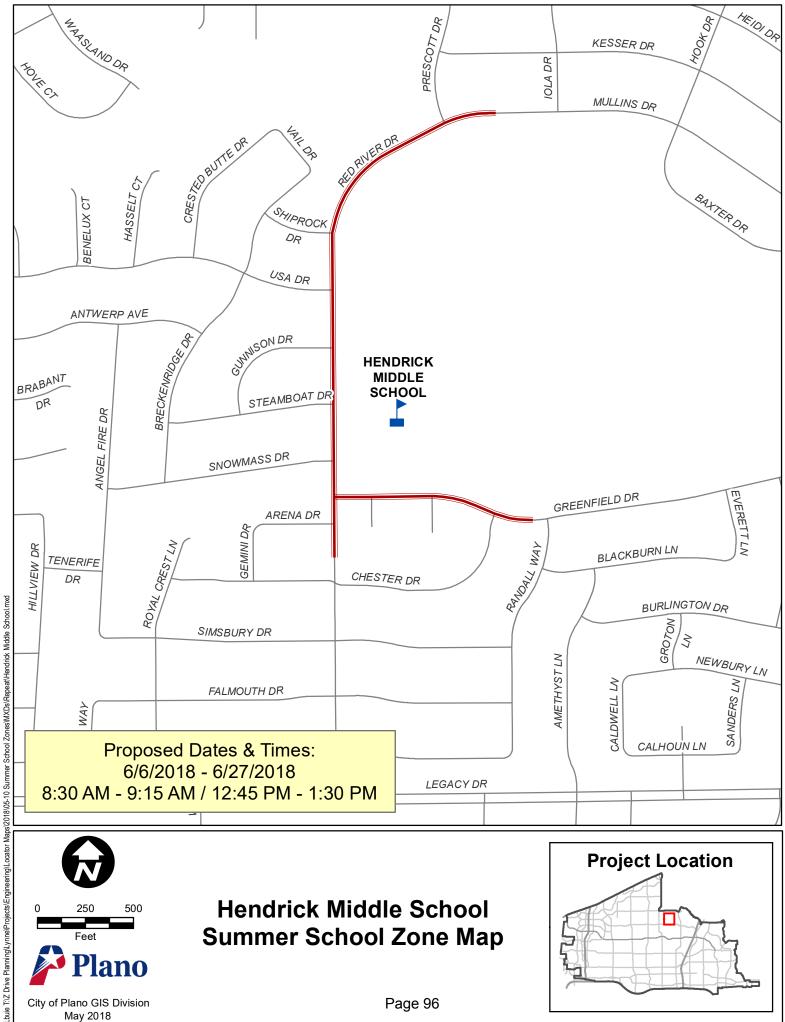


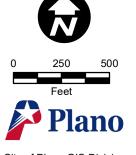




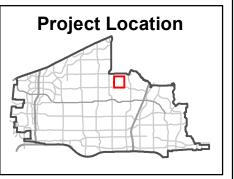
Dooley Elementary School Summer School Zone Map

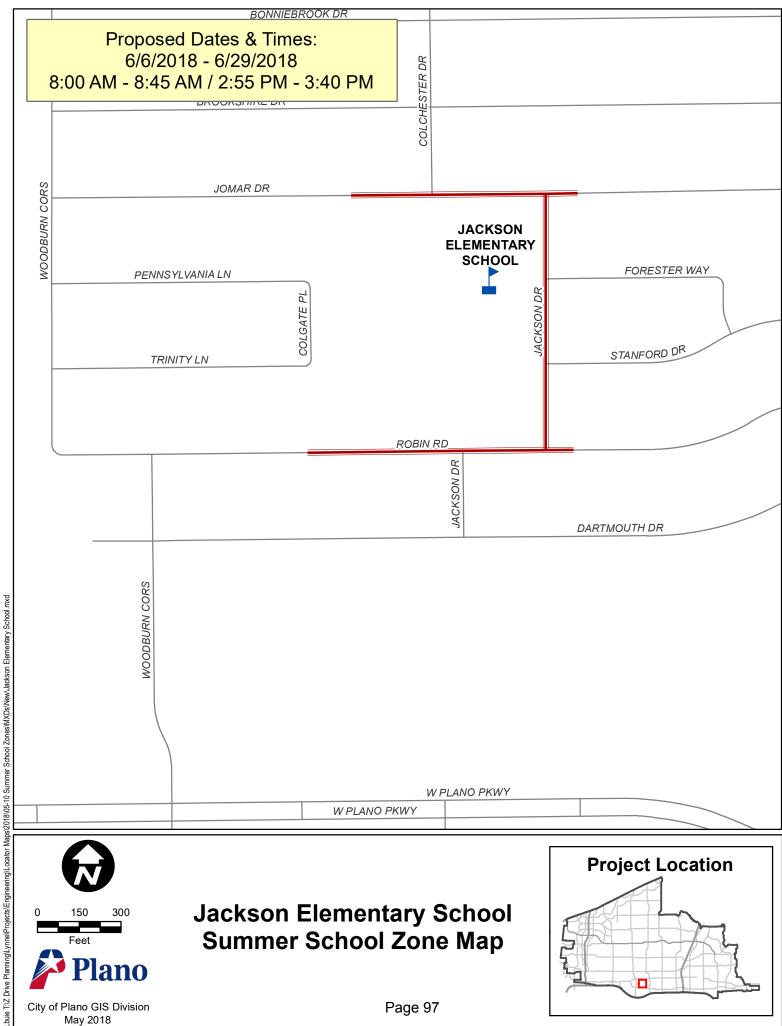


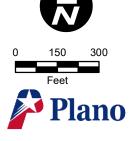




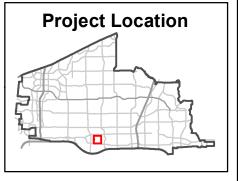
Hendrick Middle School Summer School Zone Map

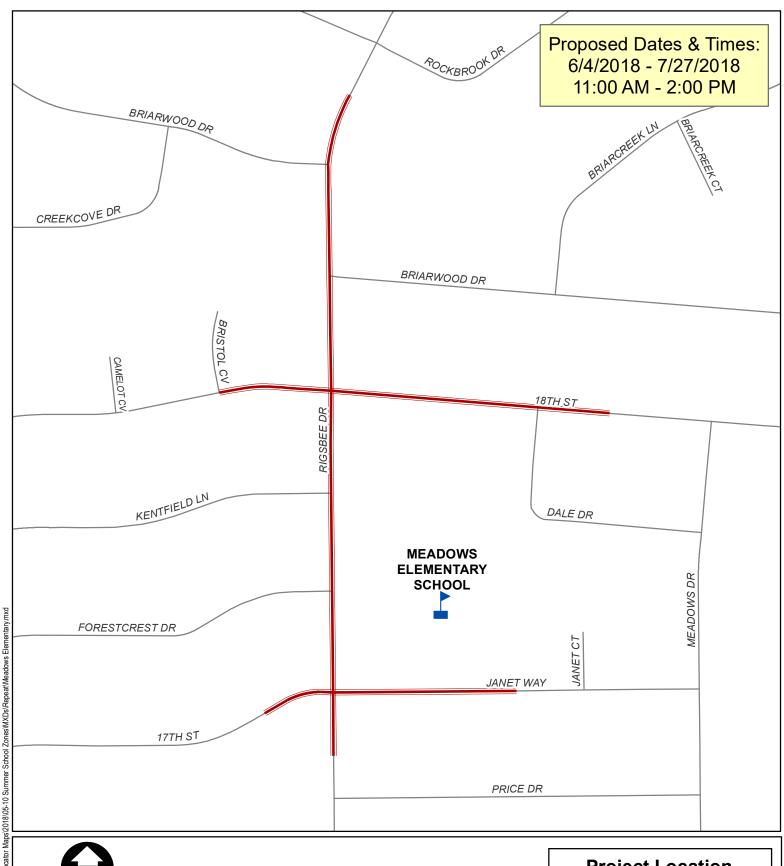


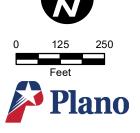




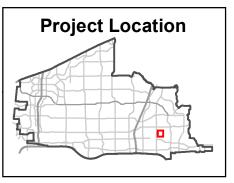
Jackson Elementary School Summer School Zone Map

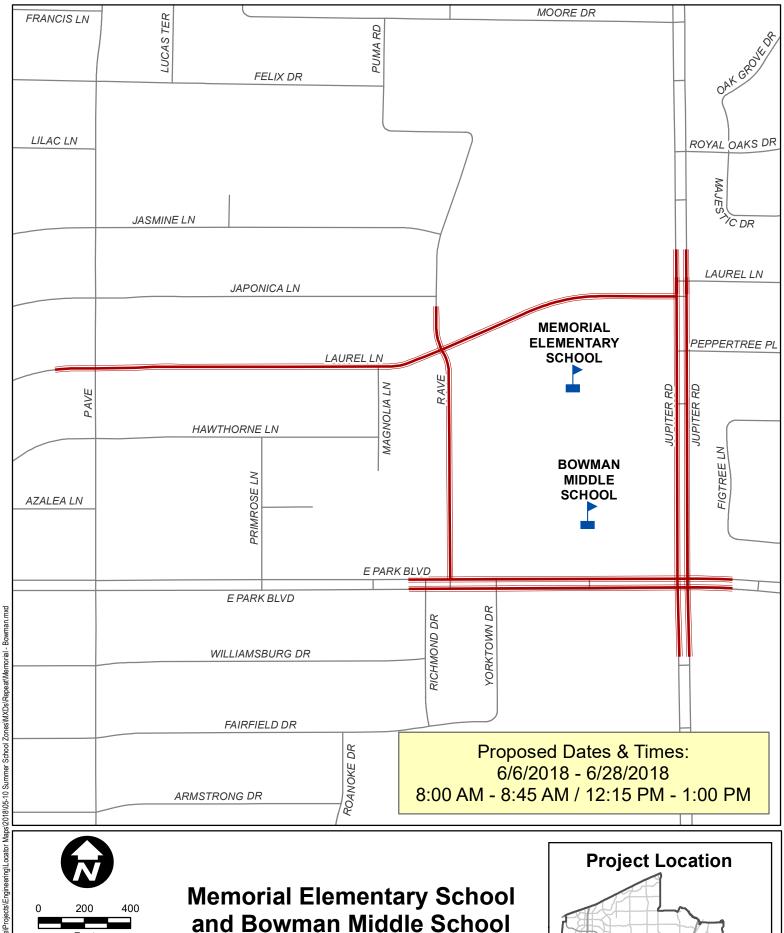

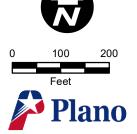




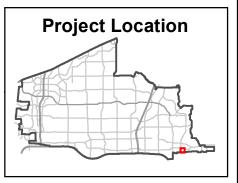
Mendenhall Elementary School Summer School Zone Map





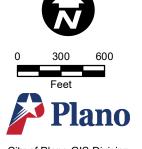


Otto Middle School Summer School Zone Map

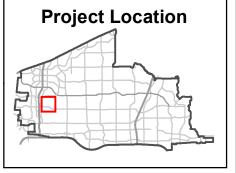


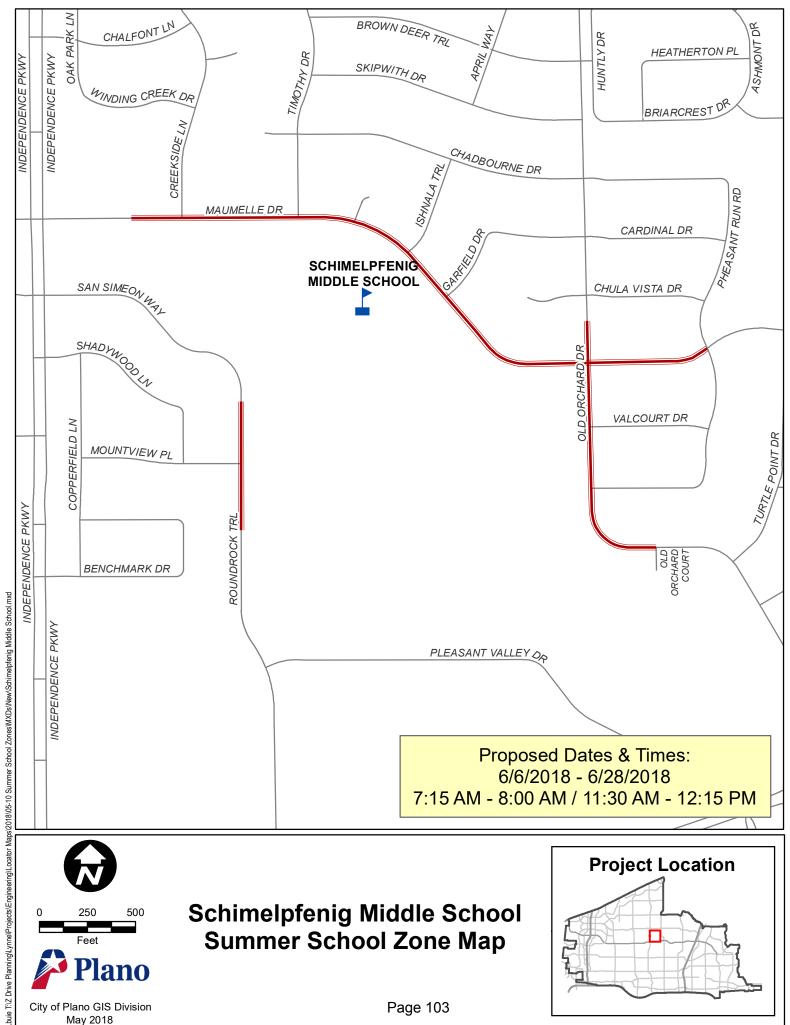

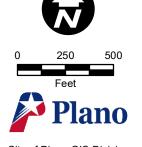




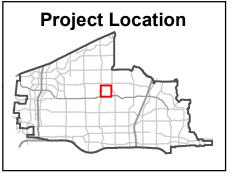
Renner Middle School Summer School Zone Map

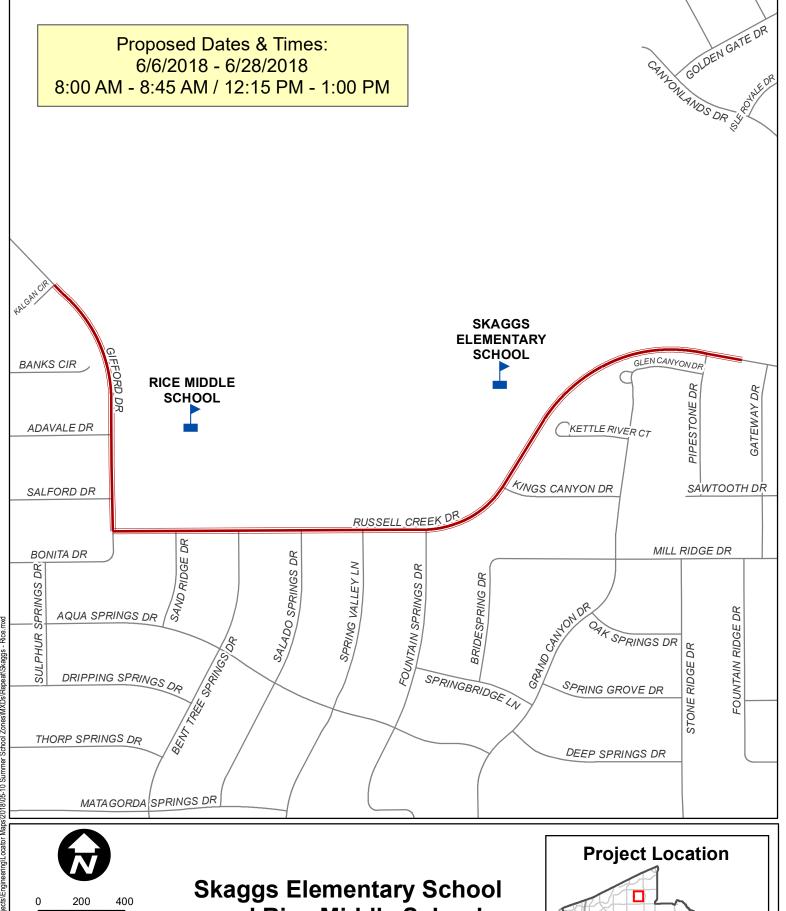


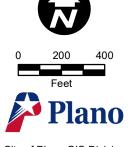




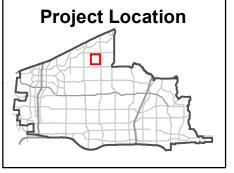

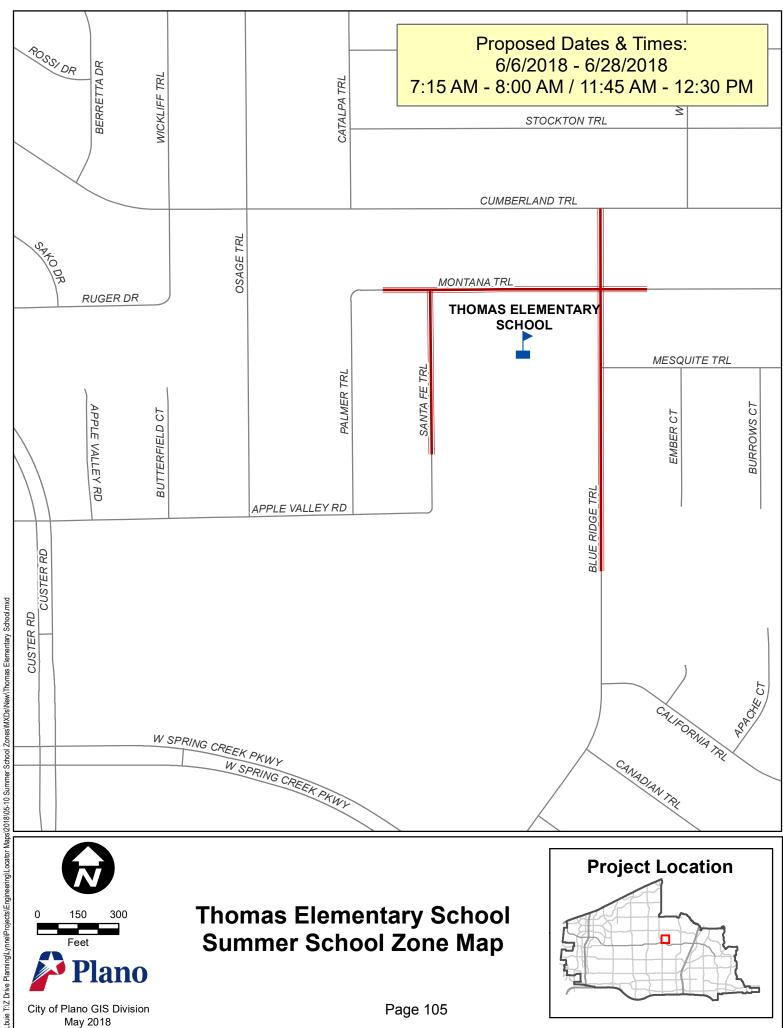


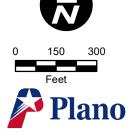
Skaggs Elementary School and Rice Middle School Summer School Zone Map



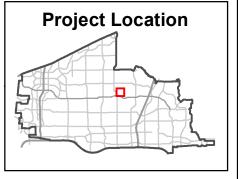

An Ordinance of the City of Plano, Texas amending Section 12-73.1(d) of Article IV, Chapter 12, Motor Vehicles and Traffic, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Plano, Texas to enact school zones for summer school sessions; providing a penalty clause, a repealer clause, a severability clause, a savings clause, a publication clause, and an effective date.

WHEREAS, both the Plano Independent School District (PISD) and the Frisco Independent School District (FISD) have schools within the City of Plano; and

WHEREAS, the PISD opens certain school campuses after the end of the regular school term for summer school sessions; and

WHEREAS, the school zones listed in Section 12-73.1(d) for summer school change from year to year as the schools used for summer school change from year to year; and

WHEREAS, an amended Section 12-73.1(d) is necessary to provide for a listing of the school zones and effective times applicable during the 2018 summer school sessions; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Plano finds it is necessary and in the best interest of the City and its citizens to enact school zones at and near schools open for summer school within the City of Plano; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds that Section 12-73.1(d) should be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLANO, TEXAS THAT:

<u>Section I.</u> Section 12-73.1(d) of Article IV, Chapter 12, Motor Vehicles and Traffic, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Plano, Texas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"(d) School zones designated. The following designated locations and areas are declared to be school zones and the prima facie maximum speed limit for all motor vehicles operated within such locations and areas on school days shall be twenty (20) miles per hour during the designated time periods. Such school zones are designed to serve a public institution of elementary or secondary education.

17th Street:

Section II. All provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Plano, codified or uncodified, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, and all other provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Plano, codified or uncodified, not in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, shall remain in full force and effect.

Section III. It is the intention of the City Council that this Ordinance, and every provision hereof, shall be considered severable, and the invalidity or unconstitutionality of any section, clause, provision or portion of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other portion of this Ordinance.

<u>Section IV.</u> Any violation of any provision or term of this ordinance shall be a Class C Misdemeanor offense. Any person, firm, corporation, or association who is adjudged guilty of a Class C Misdemeanor offense under this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed TWO HUNDRED AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$200.00) for each offense. Each and every violation shall be deemed to constitute a separate offense.

Section V. The repeal of any ordinance or part of any ordinance affectuated by the enactment of this Ordinance shall not be construed as abandoning any action now pending under or by virtue of such Ordinance or as discontinuing, abating, modifying, or

altering any penalty accruing or to accrue, or as affecting any rights of the municipality under any section or provisions of any Ordinances at the time of passage of this Ordinance.

<u>Section VI.</u> This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, publication as required by law and after all necessary signs have been installed.
